
Robert Neilson Stephens: One of Huntingdon's Own

THE ROAD

TO PARIS BY R·N·STEPHENS

o the book titles An Enemy to the King or Captain Ravenshaw mean anything to you as a Huntingdon County resident? Chances are you've never heard of them, but their creator once skipped along Huntingdon's streets, attended school here, and mourned

a father lost to him at an early age.

the Principal of the Huntingdon Academy, which Robert attended.

According to J. Simpson Africa's History of Huntingdon and Blair Counties, Pennsylvania, "In 1874, a more commodious structure was placed at the northeast corner of Fourth and Church Streets, the erection of which was secured mainly through the efforts of Professor James A. Stephens, who was the

Principal at that time. His health failing, he resigned and died in April 1876."

Stephens' early working life included clerking in a book store, holding a stenographic position with the Pennsylvania Railroad in Philadelphia, and then becoming "dramatic" editor of the Philadelphia Press. As a twenty-two-year-old newlywed, he wrote short stories to supplement his income.

He went to New York City at age twenty-six and

became a theatrical agent. Part of his job was writing plays. One of them was titled An Enemy to the King, and was completed and produced in 1896.

Then came a touch of writer's serendipity. L.C. Page, a Boston publisher, was a member of the audience. He saw in the play touches of historical romance, a genre in demand at that time. He urged Stephens to write a book based on the play and presented a contract to him within twenty-four hours. The novel came out in 1897, and Stephens' fortune was made.

Unfortunately, ill health came with it. According to H.H. Hain's History of Perry County, Stephens had a unique attitude toward his physical condition: "I would rather be ill and well-to-do, as I am, than poor and in good health, as I was for many years."

Stephens eventually went to live in England. One of the last things he wrote, before leaving this country, was The Road to Paris. In it, he used the mouth of the Juniata River, below New Bloomsburg, as a setting. His great-great-grandfather Alexander was a Jacobite who

Stephens turned out several major works in England before his health deteriorated. He died in 1905, at age thirty-nine.

So, if the name Robert Nielson Stephens comes up in conversation, you can now say, "I know the name. He was one of Huntingdon's own."





Crochet a Stocking Cap Class, with Prudence Ingerman

In a series of three sessions, Prudence will introduce the basic stitches of crochet,

and lead participants from start to finish through the creation of this easy crocheted hat.

Prudence says of this hat, "I learned to crochet this hat when I received a plea for hats for refugees in New York City. These people were waiting outside for documents in long lines in cold weather with no hats or warm clothing.



I made and sent off 143 of these hats with more to send in September, as requested. I can crochet one of these hats in just over two hours. They were greatly appreciated." Class will be on Wednesday, October 23, 30; & November 6, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. The total cost for the class is \$55 for members and \$60 for nonmembers.

Make a Hexie Flower Workshop, with Sarah Braxton

This one-session workshop introduces students to English Paper-Piecing. Students will



prepare and sew a "hexie' flower using 7 small hexagons shapes. The resulting flower may be used alone, or combined with others flowers to create a quilt. This is an entry level class into piecework – suitable for beginners, no prior experience necessary. The workshop is Thursday, October 24, from 1 to 3 p.m. The cost for the class is \$45 for members and \$50 for nonmembers.

Knitters! Try your hand at a knitted balaclava. This project will take several hours to complete. Basic knit-

ting skills are required. Balaclava is the name of a town where fierce fighting took place during the Crimean War. It was bitterly cold, and the fighters wore these (in black) with only the eyes showing. Women adapted them to the form you see here. They require close attention to detail, and are very



warm and cozy. The class will be on Saturday, October 26; November 2 & 9, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. The total cost for the class is \$55 for members and \$60 for nonmembers.

Bead Embroidery, with Marie Campbell

Tammy Ash A Lifetime of Art

f you have attended the Huntingdon County Fair during the past twenty plus years, and viewed the artwork at The Art Station, you have definitely seen the work of Tammy Ash. She is a prolific local artist, and often enters pieces in every possible medium: colored pencil, pencil, charcoal, collage, acrylic, oil, and pastel.

You name it, and she can do it, or she will learn how to do it with watercolors, an activity she has continued for thirty years.

Born in Fort Washington, Wisconsin, she and her family moved to Somerset, Pennsylvania when she was in second grade. Her father sold and worked on farm machinery, and he is the person who sparked her interest in art. He showed her how to draw, and bought acrylic and oil paints for her. When he died, she kept his framing square and uses it to frame out some of her artwork. It is a heartfelt connection to him.

Throughout her elementary and high school years, Tammy's artwork was often put on display. She fondly remembers a ceramic bowl with "A's" on it for "Ash," made in fifth grade, as well as a cradle she made out of

wood in tenth grade. Surprisingly, she did not take any art classes in college. As an adult, she tried to take art classes at several locations. Unfortunately, these were often cancelled because of low enrollment.

Tammy did, however, discover the magic of Bob Ross! While she did not paint with him, she did enjoy watching him paint. She remembers that in 1985, she produced her first painting as an adult. The medium was acrylics, and it was based off of a photo she had taken of a tobacco barn, and she has

been creating artwork ever since.

In the early 1990's, Tammy moved to Huntingdon to work as an instructor at the State Correction Institution at Smithfield (SCIS). Here in Huntingdon, she found camaraderie and a shared passion for art with the Standing Stone Art League. With weekly meetings, an "Art Week" in the summer, she found an outlet for her creativity.

Today, Tammy works mostly with watercolors. She does the majority of her painting in a sketchbook because she has run out of wall space! She paints and takes pictures. Some of her favorite "subjects" are animals, tractors, and her animal companions. When not creating art, she volunteers at the Huntingdon County Humane Society and the Huntingdon County Arts Council.
