<u>ArtistSpotlight</u>

Jeanne Peterson—A Love of Color

f you have ever have been in the Art Shoppe or the Holiday Shoppe, you must have seen Jeanne Peterson's beautiful rope bowls. The colorful bowls are practical and decorative, and showcase her artistry.

Jeanne is a Huntingdon County native, first growing up on a beef farm in the McConnellstown area, and then moving to a dairy farm in Alexandria, in time for eighth grade. As with her siblings, she worked on the farms and developed a good work ethnic that carried on throughout her life.

Her career started at the Fiberglass Tank Division, then to business school, and then to a 34 year career in the business office of the Juniata Valley School District.

Her interest in needlework began before she even remembers, and was fostered by her patient Mum-Mum (Grandmother Smith). She taught her all kinds of needlework, including crochet, knitting, machine sewing, cross stitch, and hand embroidery. As Jeanne reflexes, "It was the best gift I have ever received."

Always making something, it was not originally her idea to sell what she made. About 35 years ago, someone asked if she would make her a centerpiece doily and how much it would cost. Jeanne quoted a high price, and when she told the person they ordered two.

About 12 years ago, Jeanne started doing 3 to 4 craft shows a year. It was only about 6 years ago that she started making rope bowls. To date, she has made over 1,000.

In July, Jeanne taught a workshop at the Arts Center on how to make a rope bowl. Rope bowls are made by starting with a fabric circle for the bottom of the bowl, adding interfacing, sewing the coil in a spiral and attaching the fabric circle to the coil with a sewing machine. You can add embellishments such as beads or

even embroidery.

Jeanne confesses that she always needs a project to do, stating,"I love to keep my hands moving." Her current project is a doily with beads for wall decor, that she will dye and attach to a metal hoop.

"I love being able to have my work at the Arts Center, supporting the Arts Council, showcasing my creations and having this opportunity to sell my work," she says.
